Secrets Of The Pop Song

Brian May, Sting, Neil Tennant and Lamont Dozier are just some of the contributors to this three-part series singing the praises of the pop song. Responsible for some of the best examples of the genre, they and others provide insight into how it's done, while the programme follows the actual, hands-on process of writing a song, with the help of professional songwriter Guy Chambers. In this first episode, Chambers teams up with Rufus Wainwright (pictured) to pen a ballad. 'There's an art to feeling sorry for yourself,' says Boy George. 'There's an art to melancholy.' And there's an art to not writing a dirge – Chambers co-wrote Angels with Robbie Williams, so he should know.
